'Seaside and Safety' Welcome Planters at London Road Station, Brighton

Funding application to Sussex Police Community Cashback, July 2013

- We are a self-managing volunteer group, registered as a Station Partnership with Southern Rail.
- We do not specifically work with young people so we have no explicit child protection policy.
- Though some of our members have CRB screening for work with children and vulnerable adults, as a volunteer group, we do not require this.
- We attach our Constitution.
- We adhere to Southern Railway's Health & Safety guidelines for Station Partnerships all members sign up to these, and we have received safety briefings from Southern staff.
- As part of setting up the Station Partnership, we undertook a detailed risk assessment of our activities.
- As a Station Partnership, our members are covered by Southern's Public Liaibility Insurance at the station. As we have no employees, we have no Employer Liability Insurance
- Our Equal Opportunity Policy is included in our Constitution (point 3) attached.

SUMMARY from application form

<u>Objectives</u>: Building on our success in enhancing the environment at London Road Station (creating two gardens on waste land and participating in a successful anti-graffiti scheme), the London Road Station Partnership is now seeking funding to set up two planters at the station. This would enhance the public visibility of the Station Partnership and act as a focal point for promoting community crime awareness. This should 'encourage greater public participation in the prevention/solution of crime/ antisocial behaviour' and support 'measures designed to reduce the level and fear of crime'.

Incidence of crime at the station has already reduced since 2011 when we started our activities (see Appendix 1, BTP statistics). Through involving local people in taking care of the station, we believe we increase 'eyes on the street' and thus make the station less attractive to crime (see Kuo & Sullivan 2001: DOI: 10.1177/0013916501333002). Our regular presence at the station, particularly during times that it is unmanned, can also help to reduce fear of crime and promote confidence in street safety. This bid would enable us to maintain the momentum we have built up.

<u>Project description</u>: 1) Erect two 1m x 1m planters on the South station forecourt in Shaftesbury Place (see photo below), and plant with drought-resistant 'seaside' style plants, to act as a 'welcome' to station users and focal point for residents; 2) through associated open events (e.g. launch), raise awareness of crime prevention in the area. The station forecourt is managed by Southern Rail who have given agreement for the project (see Appendix 2, e-mail from Karen Barnes).

<u>Benefits.</u> We are a well-established station partnership with 10-15 active volunteers, supported by local residents who visit our gardens regularly to chat or contribute to community composting. The proposed project benefits 1) the active volunteers (mostly aged 60+) in providing a further focus for creative and horticultural skills, as well as benefitting direct neighbours in Shaftesbury Place (20 households), other local residents (the railway bridge is significant pedestrian thoroughfare) and station users through improvement to the external environment. It aims to demonstrate that the area is cared for, which in turn should allay fear of anti-social behaviour and deter minor crime.

<u>Schedule</u>. This project would be our 2014 season focus: we would canvass planting ideas and build further support during autumn/winter 2013-14, using our 'Big Dig' Open Day (September) and residents' association meetings, with opportunities to raise awareness about crime prevention. We would then erect and prepare the planters for planting in early spring 2014, culminating in a celebration event, probably in April 2014, depending on weather conditions. This project will link with improvements to Shaftesbury Place as part of B&H City Council's Local Sustainable Transport project (see below) and celebrations of the 150th anniversary of the Brighton to Seaford railway line.

Partnerships. As a station partnership, we work closely with Southern Railway and Sussex Community Rail Partnership (SCRP) on ways to enhance security at the station. Southern have contributed over £300 to the development of our gardens. We are already working closely with DRARA (Ditchling Rise and Area Residents' Association) and Brighton & Hove City Council on enhancing pedestrian and cycle access at London Road Station (£25K budget); the 'Seaside and Safety' Welcome Planters fit well with these plans. Through DRARA, we liaise regularly with our PCSO Bonnie Scovell on promoting crime prevention awareness. We also link with local businesses - in particular, A.A. Taylor Joinery whose business is directly opposite the station. Appendix 2 below gives supporting e-mails; see also supporting letter from SCRP.

<u>Funding.</u> The funding being applied for covers the capital investment to set up the planters. We propose to cover planting and publicity from our own funds, including £100 from A.A. Taylor, and a forthcoming funding application to Association for Community Rail Partnerships (ACorp). As with our other projects, we are able to undertake on-going maintenance and planting fairly economically. We restock planting from own propagation; we maintain soil fertility with compost from our thriving community compost facility.


<u>Potential problems</u>: We are aware that planters can a) be abandoned due to demands of maintenance, and b) themselves attract anti-social behaviour. We already have experience of maintaining large planters at Preston Circus, and of erecting smaller public herb planters at London Road Station. In neither of these cases, have we experienced any significant anti-social behaviour and both projects have generated local enthusiasm. We have a strong committed team of volunteers living very nearby the station with the required horticultural skills (including plant propagation), we have already installed water butts and we have the support of the local neighbourhood.

We have selected heavy duty planters at waist height to dissuade anti-social behaviour, as well as to facilitate planting for older participants. The planters will be carefully secured by bolts to the forecourt. The planters are designed to minimise watering and investment in growing medium.

<u>Contingency.</u> Were the London Road Station Partnership to fold, the planters could be dismantled and offered to other station partnerships/community gardens. We are closely linked to many other such groups through Harvest Brighton & Hove Food Partnership, Brighton & Hove City in Bloom, RHS 'It's Your Neighbourhood' and Association of Community Rail Partnerships (ACORP).

The Residents Association does this in the belief that a 'cared for' public environment leads to greater enjoyment of residents and visitors of a healthy, sustainable and safer environment.
